In the appendix of his new book "Where the River Bends: Considering Forgiveness in the Lives of Prisoners," McRay tells of encounters with these men, exposing the dehumanization, violence, and suffering of life behind prison walls. Each story ends with a prayer, attempting to find language for and to God amidst such devastation. In this session, McRay will share selections from these, discussing the spiritual rhythms of storytelling and prayer he used to process prison life. Taking to heart that Jesus is found among the "least of these," McRay sought to experience these encounters as run-ins with the actual body and blood of Christ.
